#### Prescription Drug Purchasing (working title only, subject to change)

#### The Way It Is Now:

The City and County of San Francisco (City) purchases prescription drugs for health services provided by the City. The City provides inpatient health services at San Francisco General Hospital and Laguna Honda Hospital. It also provides outpatient health services at City hospitals and clinics and the San Francisco jail.

The City spends more than \$23 million per year on prescription drugs.

City law authorizes San Francisco's Public Health Department to use outside companies to negotiate prices and purchase prescription drugs.

- For inpatient medications and medications for jail inmates, the City uses a company that negotiates drug prices with drug manufacturers.
- For outpatient medications, the City participates in a federal program that offers a significant discount on prescription drugs. To ensure that it remains eligible for this program, the City uses a federally selected company to negotiate prices and purchase outpatient prescription drugs.

#### The Proposal:

Proposition \_\_\_\_ would make it City policy to continue to use all available opportunities to reduce the City's cost of prescription drugs. It would also establish as policy that the City continue to negotiate directly with drug manufacturers to reduce its cost for medications.

Proposition \_\_\_\_ would also establish as policy that the City ask its state and federal government representatives to sponsor legislation to reduce by one-third the drug prices paid by all levels of government.

**A "YES" Vote Means:** If you vote "yes," you want to make it City policy to continue to use all available opportunities to reduce the City's cost of prescription drugs.

A "NO" Vote Means: If you vote "no," you do not want to adopt this policy.
