WRITE-IN CANDIDATES		
HOW THE WRITE IN PERIOD WORKS	An incumbent, running in the June Primary, can win outright with the highest number of votes either by a regular challenger or by a write-in candidate.	
	If the incumbent wins his/her office in the June Primary, the incumbent will not face any opposition in the November General Election. This only applies to Judges that face opposition on the June ballot and is not the case for an unopposed Judge.	
	An unopposed Judge in the June Primary is still open to a challenge by a write-in candidate in the November General Election if the write-in candidate challenges a Judge that ran unopposed in June. The challenged Judge will then be put on the November ballot with a blank space for the write-in's name (CAEC § 8203).

If a petition indicating that a write-in campaign will be conducted for the office at the general election, signed by the number of registered voters qualified to vote with respect to the office specified in CAEC 8203(a), is filed with the elections officials not less than 83 days before the general election, the name of the incumbent shall be placed on the general election ballot if it has not appeared on the direct primary election ballot.
