Ready for New Laws

A new method of registration will be in effect for the next election. Conditional Voter Registration (CVR) allows an individual to register and vote conditionally at the City Hall Voting Center during the 14 days before Election Day and on Election Day.



CVR registrations will be treated and processed the same as other registrations and CVR provisional ballots will be treated and processed the same as other provisional ballots.

International High School Students

When we approached students at International High School about serving as High School Poll Workers on Election Day, these 16 and 17-year olds made an interesting choice. About 1,000 San Francisco high school students volunteer as poll workers for each election. Just like adult poll workers, the students receive training, help voters throughout the City all day on Election Day, and receive a stipend for their service. The 21 IHS students who worked in November 2016 took this hands-on civics lesson to another level when they decided to serve their City on Election Day and then donate their stipends to a good cause. While we are still working out the details, here is a sneak peak: you and your group will do some role playing to experience a variety of scenarios you might encounter. Did You Know?

You may recall, part of your tasks on Election Day is to set-up an accessible polling place with a five-foot turning radius in front of tables, booths and machines. Have you ever wondered why? Did you notice a new orange measuring string provided in your plastic supply kit? The orange string is helpful to measure a five-foot turning radius to ensure that all voters, including voters who use wheelchairs, can use the space. Five feet is about the space needed to turn around in a wheelchair.



You also provide voters with a variety of tools to ensure that they can vote a private and independent ballot. Did you know that the foam pen grip that you place on the Election Table helps people who have limited mobility in their hands? Similarly, the page magnifier helps people with low vision. Of course, you are familiar with the Edge voting machine and the fact that a voter can use it to vote a touchscreen ballot, or an audio ballot. But did you know that voters can also use a sip/puff device to mark their ballot on the Edge? This device allows a voter to use their breath to interact with the machine, and is available to be dispatched from City Hall to any polling place on Election Day. These are just a few of the tools available to ensure accessibility.

Ready for Community Events

Ready for understanding accessibility! On July 18 from 5-6 p.m. come to the Main Library Atrium where we'll be demonstrating accessible voting machines, explaining services for voters with disabilities, registering voters, and recruiting members to the Voting Accessibility Advisory Committee (VAAC). Then from 6-7 p.m. we'll move up to the Main Library Learning Studio prior to author HolLynn D'Lil's presentation on her book, Becoming Real in 24 Days, about the demonstration for accessibility rights featured in the Patient No More exhibit.
