

Restore Your Vote!

**Do you have a criminal conviction?
You may be eligible to vote.**

To vote in California elections, you must be:
1) a United States citizen, 2) a resident of California,
3) at least 18 years old on Election Day, 4) not
currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a
court, and 5) not currently serving a state or federal
prison term for the conviction of a felony.

You are eligible to vote if you are:

- In county jail serving a misdemeanor sentence, felony jail sentence, or awaiting trial
- On parole or probation (for any type of conviction)
- On mandatory or post-release community supervision, or
- Subject to a juvenile wardship adjudication

You are not currently eligible to vote if you are:

- Serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony.



Finished serving your term?

Your right to vote is restored but you must still register to vote!

You can register to vote online or by mail using a paper registration form up to 15 days before the next election. After that date, you will need to register in person at a voting center or polling place, and vote while you are there.

Visit **RegisterToVote.ca.gov** to fill out an online application or contact the Department of Elections to request a paper registration form in the mail.

Paper forms are also available at many government buildings, such as libraries and public assistance agencies.
